Role/job:	On the recommendation of Archdeacon Thomas, he conducted a survey into the Aborigines of the coastal region, and their relations with the settlers. (Long afterwards (1883) he published his book <i>Aborigines of Australia</i> .) After completing his survey he came to in 1829 as Master of the Male Orphan School, succeeding the Rev. Cartwright's tenure, and was its longest serving master until it closed in 1850-51. He was also a Catechist at St Lukes, 'having a life- long devotion to the Protestant cause'. He was also interested in a wide range of current issues such as education and local government, and wrote many pamphlets and letters to the papers. He was a member of the Legislative Assembly for the Lower Hunter from 1861-64.	
Contribution to Liverpool:	As Master of the Male Orphan School, he was also one of the senior public officials in the district, and had public roles such as secretary of the Roads Trust at Liverpool. This meant he authorised money for road repairs and managed contracts and employment that benefited the community in a broad sense. He was first Mayor of Liverpool in 1872 at the age of 78, a JP, and also a member of denominational school boards. Church administration took much of his time and so did charitable and philanthropic work. He was also on the committees of the Sydney Sailors' Home and Sydney Bethel Union.
