

Passive Parks and Reserves

Chipping Norton, Moorebank, Wattle Grove, Casula, Hammondville and Voyager Point

Council is committed to supporting high quality community parks, reserves and open space that meet the needs of the community.

These parks and reserves are accessible to everyone and are for the enjoyment of the community. Council has installed barbecues, shelters, walking and bike tracks, with play and recreational equipment available for all ages.

These parks were established and are maintained to complement each area's natural beauty.

What's Available

Chipping Norton Lakes – Homestead Avenue

Councils most visited site is situated in an ideal setting on the banks of Chipping Norton Lakes.

There are five passive recreational parks within what is known as Chipping Norton Lakes – Angle Park, Grand Flaneur Park, Homestead Park, Long Point Reserve and Black Muscat Park.

With opening times from sunrise to sunset, these parks are popular with amateur fishermen and are great places for family gatherings and celebrations.

<u> Haigh Park – Bridges Road</u>

Haigh Park is a popular site for family gatherings. The park offers barbecue and picnic huts, and a great walking and bike track around the water's edge. It's a lovely spot for family to enjoy a great weekend get-together.

<u>Lt Cantello Reserve – Stewart Avenue</u>

This reserve is a beautiful natural area, with dirt walking tracks and lovely shaded areas. The reserve is also the only area in Liverpool where your family dog can be unleashed to run around.

The reserve's open from sunrise to sunset and is a great natural bush park for the Liverpool community.

<u> Wattle Grove Lake – Wattle Grove Drive</u>

Wattle Grove Lake, also known as Lakeside Park, is a picturesque lake with a well established walking track around the perimeter.

A lovely passive park with picnic areas and playgrounds, the area is very popular for children's birthdays.

The gazebo in the park is extremely popular and is available for wedding photos. Make your booking for these photos with Council.

<u>Voyager Park – Sirius Road</u>

Located in the beautiful suburb of Voyager Point, this small park has some excellent native bush corridor tracks and a picturesque wetland lake.

The park is just perfect for a picnic lunch with the family or a nature walk.

Leacocks Regional Park – Leacocks Lane

Leacocks Regional Park, a natural asset of the community of Liverpool, is run by National Parks and not Council. Council recommends a visit to this beautiful park.
