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1. INTRODUCTION

1.1. BACKGROUND

The Liverpool local government area (LGA) is located in South West Sydney. Liverpool is part of the NSW Government's recently identified *Western Sydney Airport Growth Area* that is projected to experience significant economic and population growth. Liverpool is recognised as a strategic commercial centre within the growth areas, and will be central to continued economic development in the region.

1.2. PURPOSE OF THIS REPORT

This document provides an overview of the Liverpool LGA economy, including an analysis of key economic indicators and trends. It also provides the most recent estimates of economic and employment activity within the Liverpool LGA. It compares Liverpool with several regions including:

- South West Sydney¹, which consists of the following LGAs:
 - Liverpool
 - Camden
 - Campbelltown
 - Fairfield, and
 - Wollondilly.
- · Western Sydney, which includes:
 - Blue Mountains
 - Camden
 - Campbelltown
 - Fairfield
 - Hawkesbury
 - Liverpool
 - Penrith
 - Wollondilly
- Greater Sydney²
- NSW.

1.3. METHODOLOGY

The information and data presented in this document have primarily been sourced from a range of publicly available sources, principally the Australian Bureau of Statistics, and other Commonwealth and NSW Government departmental publications and data sources. Estimates of Gross Regional Product have been estimated using the REMPLAN input-output model.

2. ECONOMIC PROFILE

Liverpool's economy is undergoing rapid transformation and growth, underpinned by significant population growth and a transition towards more knowledge-intensive industries such as Health Care, Social Assistance, Education and Training. Other sectors contributing to Liverpool's continued economic growth include: Retail Trade; Accommodation and Food Services; Transport, Postal and Warehousing; and Public Administration and Safety. Furthermore, its growing young and culturally diverse workforce will continue to attract businesses to the region.

Key statistics for the economy are outlined in Table 2.1. Further details are in Section 3 (Population Demographics), Section 4 (Economy Size and Structure), and Section 5 (Labour Market) and 6 (Property).

Key findings relating to Liverpool's economy are:

- Liverpool's economy totalled \$11.4 billion in Gross Regional Product (GRP) in 2016-17³, accounting for 2% of NSW's total economic activity. Liverpool's economy grew by an average annual real rate of 2.2% over the ten years from 2006-07.
- The number of employed persons working in Liverpool increased to almost 67,900 in 2016, a 26% increase from 2011. Reflecting Liverpool's rapidly growing population, the local labour force was just over 100.000 in June 2017.
- The top employment sectors accounted for almost 59% of total LGA employment and 49% of total industry value-added:
 - Health Care and Social Assistance, reflecting the continued growth and contribution of the Liverpool Health Precinct, accounted for 17.2% employment and 11.9% of industry value-added;
 - Driven by Liverpool's rapidly growing population, Retail Trade accounted for 12.1% of local employment and 6.4% of industry value-added;
 - Manufacturing activity still accounted for 11.0% of local employment and 10.6% of industry valueadded, reflecting the continued importance of traditional manufacturing, but also the transition occurring towards advanced manufacturing, within Liverpool;
 - Education and Training, supported by the expansion of key universities within the Liverpool CBD, accounted for 9.9% of total employment in 2016, and 6.8% of industry value-added; and
 - Public Administration and Safety accounted for 8.4% of total employment and 13.3% of industry value-added.
- Local unemployment has fallen to 4.9% in December 2017, from 6.8% five years ago, reflecting the greater access to economic opportunities brought about by Liverpool's growing economy. However, unemployment remains higher than Greater Sydney (4.7%) and NSW (4.8%).
- Labour force participation in Liverpool has increased slightly over the last five years from 62.5% to 63.4%. While this is below the participation rate of Greater Sydney (68.5%), South West Sydney, Western Sydney and Greater Sydney have all experienced decreasing participation rates over the last five years.⁴
- While Liverpool's economy continues to transition to more knowledge-intensive industries, a lower
 proportion of Liverpool residents have tertiary education qualifications compared to Greater Sydney and
 NSW as a whole. The proportion of residents with a bachelor degree or higher is about half the Sydney
 average. This reflects the continued importance of sectors such as Manufacturing, Transport, Postal and
 Warehousing to the local economy.
- The most prominent occupation of the local workforce (i.e. those who work in Liverpool) is professionals, followed by clerical & administrative workers. The median personal income in 2016 was \$584 per week, which is 19% lower than Greater Sydney.

- Consistent with house prices across Sydney, median dwelling prices in Liverpool have recorded strong growth since 2009. However, housing remains affordable in Liverpool compared to other parts of Sydney, with the median dwelling price in Liverpool 36%⁵ below the median dwelling price in the Inner Ring⁶ of Sydney.
- Liverpool's population was just over 204,000 in 2016, making it the 9th most populated LGA in NSW.
- Liverpool's population is projected to growth by 2.4% p.a. during the next 20 years.⁷ This is faster than the projected growth rate for South West Sydney, Western Sydney, Greater Sydney and NSW, and reflects the major growth planned for the South West Growth Centre towards the west of the LGA.
- Liverpool has a relatively young population with 44% of the population aged under 30. The average age for the LGA (at 35 years) is 3 years younger than the Greater Sydney average. This reflects the large proportion of young families living in the LGA.
- Nearly half of residents in Liverpool were born overseas, highlighting the significant cultural diversity of the LGA. Furthermore, 52% of the population speaks a language other than English at home, well above the Sydney average of 36%.8

Figure 3-1 - Population—Historical and Projected, 2011 - 2056



Figure 3-2 - Population by Age and Sex-Liverpool, 2016







Figure 3-3 - Projected Population by Age - Liverpool (Number of People)








Figure 3-6 - Projected Population by Age — Sydney Metropolitan Region (Proportion of Population)
















